Chuck loved to get people talking to each other despite obstacles. Whether those obstacles took the form of the U.S.-Mexican Border, where to put an airport, or what to do about the education gap, Chuck believed in the power of communication. No wonder he loved serving as the Executive Director of the San Diego Dialogue from 1991 till 2003. The Dialogue, a bi-national civic group based at the University of California, San Diego, is the leading forum for policy, research and public education on the San Diego/Baja California region.

An admirer of Adam Smith, Herbert Marcuse, and thoughtfulness in general, Chuck earned his B.A. at Harvard. He worked for IF Stone on the (in)famous Weekly, writing the inside pages, before earning his Ph.D. from Brandeis University, where he also taught. After a stint teaching at the England Conservatory of Music, he joined the Sociology Department at the University of California, San Diego in 1980.

In 1990, Chuck and The Dialogue discovered each other. From then on, he served on many community boards, including the San Diego Convention & Visitors Bureau, the Advisory Council of the Immigration Museum of New Americans, the Advisory Committee for the Port of San Diego, and the Strategic Framework Citizens Committee for the City of San Diego. He also served on the Citizen Advisory Committee for Transportation --SANDAG and the MTDB Community Leaders committee.

His positive outlook and energy made Chuck widely admired and loved. His friends and family have created this memorial lectureship to commemorate Chuck and his values.
